




Olgoonik Shareholder Locations

WAINWRIGHT UPDATES

HOMESITE PROGRAM: OC Lands is working to better define the Homesite Program to meet the needs of Wainwright. The new team identified a number of gaps in the program and has enlisted the help of their legal team and other North Slope Borough stakeholders knowledgeable in homesite planning.

ICE CELLARS: OC officially filed the 14(c)3 Map of Boundaries with BLM. After the one-year waiting period, land set aside for the Municipal Ice Cellar

Reserve will be conveyed to the City of Wainwright. At that point, the City will determine the path forward.

HOTEL/RESTAURANT: Construction is in full swing! The building lift was a success and the new structure has taken shape. Specialty contractors are on-site working on the mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and interior finishes. The project is on track to be completed by mid-April, 2018!

Notice Board of Directors Election

January 2, 2018

Three Board of Directors seats will be up for election at the 2018 Olgoonik Corporation Annual Shareholders Meeting to be held Saturday, June 16, 2018. The term for each seat is three years.

To be elected to the Olgoonik Corporation, a candidate must be a shareholder of Olgoonik Corporation who is at least 18 years of age or older and also either an original shareholder or a lineal descendant of an original shareholder.
