INTRODUCTION

Apprenticeships are great opportunities for individuals to consider. Not only can you **earn pay while you train for your career**, but many apprenticeships also offer the opportunity to earn college credit for a future degree.

If you aren't immediately interested in a college degree, you might be asking yourself if or why that matters. Simply put, it can impact your future. In the immediate future, you may not want to earn a college degree in the traditional sense, but for your **professional growth and development** later on down the line, you may want to reconsider. Applying for an apprenticeship program that also allows you to earn college credit helps you keep your options open for the future because it can make you **more competitive for promotions, raises, or additional opportunities**.

As you'll learn in this guide, **apprenticeships are jobs**. Like with any job, any goal, or any educational pathway, they take hard work and commitment, but many who complete apprenticeships find that **dedication to be well worth it** when they see it start paying off.

Apprenticeships: Earn while you learn!

Apprenticeships are full-time commitments that can take several years to complete but are excellent options for dedicated individuals. It's important to know that apprenticeships *are* jobs. Apprentices earn wages from their employers as they go through training to learn their craft.

Apprenticeship Basics

An apprentice is an individual employed under a mentor to learn a skill. Training involves both hands-on (on-the-job) and job-related classroom instruction. Apprentices have a **structured training plan and individualized training** that focuses on mastering the skills needed by the employer and for the apprentice's craft. Apprentices earn a **percentage of a journeyman-level worker's pay** and it **increases each year** as the apprentice moves through the program. Upon completion, graduates can begin working and earning full pay.

Some apprenticeship opportunities are available through a specific employer or association (like the IBEW Alaska chapter) while others may be available as part of program offerings at a college, community college, or vocational school.

A Pathway to a Degree

Some apprenticeships allow students to **earn college credit** while training and working, creating a **pathway to a future degree**. Even if you're not considering earning a degree like an associate or bachelor's right now, this can still be a great option for students to have in their back pockets. As you learn about your craft you may decide that it's **worthwhile for your professional development** to follow through with earning that degree down the road.

The **Automotive Mechanic** and **Diesel Mechanic Apprenticeships** through the University of Alaska Anchorage's Career and Technical College are great examples of apprenticeship experience that can lead to a future degree. Each on-the-job training component is accompanied by Related Technical Instruction courses that contain the same courses a student would take pursuing the **Automotive and Diesel Technologies certificate** or the **Apprenticeship Technologies A.A.S. degree**.



Apprenticeship Opportunities: Where to look

There are a ton of resources, organizations, schools, and employers out there that offer apprenticeships or advertise available opportunities in a variety of fields. Finding them can be as easy as Google searching a few key words but to help make the process easier, consider starting with the links in the sections that follow. University of Alaska (UAA, UAF)

Mentioned in the previous section, the Automotive Mechanic and Diesel Mechanic Apprenticeships offered through UAA are great local options to consider. If UAA isn't the right fit for you, if you have another apprenticeship lined up, or if you've already completed an apprenticeship program, UAF also offers an A.A.S. in Apprenticeship Technology for eligible students.


US Dept. of Labor, Apprenticeships
